



OCHA Field Situation Report 6
Indonesia – Earthquake
West Java – Central Java Provinces
24 July 2006, 17:00

This report is developed by HC/RC Office in Indonesia based on information provided by the National Coordination Board for Disaster Management (BAKORNAS PB), Provincial Coordinating Unit for Disaster Management (SATKORLAK PB) West Java, Priangan Coordination Board (BAKORWIL Priangan), Ministry of Social Affairs, Ministry of Health (MOH), IFRC, Indonesian Red Cross (PMI), Inter-Agency Assessment Team Jakarta and Yogyakarta, and media reports.

I. SITUATION

1. The National Coordination Board for Disaster Management (BAKORNAS PB) reported on 24 July (06h00) that the death toll stands at 637 dead, 543 injured, and 165 missing. Verification of data is still ongoing. To date, the breakdown of figures is as follows:

2. The IDP numbers in Ciamis District have significantly dropped and as per SATLAK Ciamis, the following figures have been reported (22 July, 18h00) in the six-affected sub-districts:

- Pangandaran:	10,034 IDPs
- Kalipucang:	2,617 IDPs
- Sidamulih:	3,166 IDPs
- Parigi:	1,186 IDPs
- Cijulang:	1,883 IDPs
- Cimerak:	<u>5,428 IDPs</u>
Total:	24,314 IDPs

II. NATIONAL RESPONSE

3. Local authorities continue to provide temporary shelters, public kitchens, health services, and non-food items to the affected population.
4. The Department of Public Works Office in Ciamis District has begun on 23 July the clean up of debris in all affected areas in the district. This task will continue for a period of two weeks.
5. As of 22 July, the Provincial Health Office deployed 702 health workers to the affected areas in the province of West Java. Health posts staffed with doctors and nurses are aiding victims 24 hours a day in two 12-hour shifts. In total, there are 22 health posts in Ciamis District.
6. The West Java provincial government estimates that the losses due to the earthquake and tsunami in Ciamis District amount to Rp.166,208,600,000 (US\$17,495,650).
7. There is commercial air service available from Pangandaran to Jakarta in small aircrafts (Cessna). Flights depart daily from Pangandaran at 14h00 and from Jakarta (Halim Perdanakusuma Airport) at 15h30.

III. INTERNATIONAL RESPONSE

8. WHO will facilitate refresher trainings using MOH and WHO guidelines and standard operating procedures (SOPs) based on lessons learnt from the Aceh Tsunami and the Java Earthquake to assist post trauma care and tetanus control. WHO will deploy ATS (Anti Tetanus Serum) and TT (Tetanus Toxoid) to the affected area on Tuesday 25 July. WHO is also supporting MOH planning for a measles campaign in affected areas.
9. UNICEF, through the Ministry of Health, supports the operational cost for a measles campaign (22 July) and TT vaccination to take place today in 26 villages in Ciamis District.
10. Since the emergency response in West Java and Central Java provinces have been adequately addressed and no further immediate international assistance is required, this Situation Report will be the last issued by the UN HC/RC Office.

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
